
Sunday 7th May – Birdwatcher Training Workshop – Southern NSW Birds on Farm Project

As part of Corowa District Landcare's project on Improving Soil Health through Regenerative Cropping we are running an on-farm composting workshop with David Hardwick. David is an agroecologist and has over 20 years experience in rural landscapes, farming and food systems. He develops and delivers many of the extension projects for Soil Land Food across Australia. This workshop will cover how to make high-quality compost on your farm using simple, low labour methods.

This project is funded by the Australian Government's National Landcare Program Smart Farms Small Grants. It is about improving the soil health literacy of local farmers and empowering them to make decisions that benefit the landscape, their bottom line and our community.

Wednesday 14th June – No Kill Cropping Workshop with Bruce Maynard - venue to be confirmed.

Bruce Maynard has over 30 years experience in the fields of No Kill Cropping, Stress Free Stockmanship, Self Herding and Grassland Grain. He has implemented these practices on his own farm as well as supported landholders across Australia. No Kill Cropping and Pasture Cropping are systems that grow crops within grasslands rather than replacing grasslands as conventional systems do. The methods are adaptable and resilient, providing profitable production whilst slashing inputs and, therefore, risk.

Bruce will also be doing an evening introductory session on Self Herding after the workshop at a local pub - the session will be called 'Drink Droving'.

Forewarned is Forearmed


Supported by MLA, The Bureau of Meteorology has released a number of new climate tools as a part of its Forewarned is Forearmed project, to support producers in making timely decisions on farm. These consist of five new forecast products for extreme events. Six industry partners collaborated on the project representing the livestock, wine, cotton, grains, sugar, and dairy industries. Industry decision support tools have been developed for all six industries.

An extension package of the project is training extension staff to use the tools and deliver training to producers. HLN can deliver this training to producers either online or face to face if there is enough interest, so let us know if you would like to be involved.

The tools include:

- Rainfall and temperature forecasts for weekly, monthly, and seasonal timeframes at specific locations
- The probability of rainfall over a week, month or season exceeding any amount
- Outlooks for three-day rainfall bursts at significant measurements of 15, 25, 50 and 75mm.

Producers are encouraged to search their location when using the tools to view locally relevant climate data. To access the tools CLICK HERE

Funding Opportunities

Nuffield Scholarship Applications Open Applications for 2024 close on Friday 9 June 2023:

Applications are now open for Nuffield Australia's 2024 Scholarship program, which for the first time includes scholarships aimed at drought resilience study topics. The Future Drought Fund (FDF) is investing \$1.6 million dollars through Nuffield over the next two years to help farmers increase their knowledge of drought resilience and better prepare themselves and their communities for a changing climate. Scholars will have the opportunity to travel overseas to study drought resilience and learn from international leaders in the field. Each scholarship is valued at \$35,000 and farmers and others working in food and fibre production aged between 28 and 45 should apply now. Applications close 9 June 2023. Critical Producer Grant Up to \$100,000 Closes 30 June 2023:

The objective of the program is to help primary producers and primary production enterprises impacted by the February and March 2022 NSW Severe Weather and Flooding events to rebuild and recover in the medium to longer term with the aim of supporting job security, future resilience and enabling future production. Rural Landholders Grants Up to \$25,000 Applications close 30 June 2023:

Grants available for landholders and oyster farmers in declared Local Government Areas (LGAs), who have holdings of at least 10ha of rural land or a Class A aquaculture permit authorising at least 1ha; and receive at least \$20,000 in income from primary production per annum. What's been happening?

Friends of River Street Wetlands:

A "Friends of River Street Wetlands" group has been formed. This groups meets at the wetlands (66 Federation Ave, Corowa) on the 2nd and 4th Sunday of each month from 2 to 4 pm. Equipment has been purchased for the team of volunteers to use at the site. The main tasks that have been completed to date are weeding and rubbish removal. In conjunction with Federation Council, weed spraying and tree (figs, palms, privets etc) will be removed.





Superb Parrot: field day 1st March 2023, Savernake Station

A Breakfast with Superb Parrots was hosted by Ann & Alex Sloane, at Savernake Station. Speakers on the day included Ben Humphries (BirdLife Australia), Lou Bull (Murray Local Land Services), Sue Logie (Picola Superb Parrot Project), and Nicki Taws (Greening Australia).

During the day we discover the mystery and beauty of Superb Parrots, learnt how to identify them, found out what you can do to help them and how you can get involved in monitoring by simply sharing your bird sightings.

This event was held as a collaboration between Corowa District Landcare, with Murray Local Land Services and Bird Life Australia.





Yuluma Wetlands Field Day: (7th March 2023, Lakeside, Urana)

After a couple of postponements last year due to flooding, the Yuluma Plains Wetlands Field Day was held on Tuesday 7th March. There was a total of 40 participants. The field day was hosted by Charlie and Tana Webb, on their property "Lakeside" near Urana.

The field day provided a unique opportunity to visit high conservation, managed wetlands on a productive, profitable agricultural property. This demonstrated that conservation and production can co-exist in agricultural landscapes. About one third of Tana and Charlie Webb's property is wetland. During the field day, four different wetland habitats were visited.

Wildlife Ecologist, Dr Matt Herring, talked about the diversity of wetland birds and their habitat needs. To quote Matt on the wetland bird species seen on the day "2 Black-tailed Godwit, 200+ Sharp-tailed Sandpiper, a pair of Brolgas, 100+ Intermediate Egret, breeding Red-necked Avocet, Black Falcons hunting quail, Gull-billed Tern and many more. All of this thanks to farmers maintaining well managed wetlands on their properties."

Matt Herring also highlighted the need to actively manage wetland areas. This assists with maintenance of habitat for species. Areas cannot just be locked-up.

Corowa District Landcare provided transport from Corowa to the field day site.

This event was supported with funding through the Partnering in Private Land Conservation. A joint initiative delivered by Landcare NSW and the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust Partnership.





Improving Soil Health through Regenerative Cropping in the Corowa Region

This project aims to improve soil health in the Corowa region through a facilitated farmer to farmer Soil Health Learning Group (six sessions) Digging Deeper into Soils course with local agroecologist David Hardwick from Soil Land Food and four Regenerative Cropping workshops. The soil health learning group will be facilitated by agroecologist David Hardwick, one of Australia's leading soil extension specialists. The purpose of the group is to increase the soil health literacy, knowledge, skills and decision-making capacity of local farmers to improve soil health through best practice sustainable agriculture, notably, regenerative cropping. The four workshops will be an opportunity to bring soil health and regenerative cropping experts to the community to raise awareness about the benefits of regenerative cropping and increase the capacity of farmers to improve soil health by adopting these practices. Three videos will be produced to share the project experience and learnings with a wider audience and communicate the potential of regenerative cropping in improving soil health.

Hop into Frogs Educational Kit

Through our Sounding the Chorus of Frogs in Corowa Wetlands Project, we have produced the Hop into Frogs Educational Kit. This kit has been created for students and educators in the Corowa region to support frogrelated learning opportunities and experiences in schools. It is tailored to the local environment and local frog populations.
