Farm Water Management Workshops Splitters Creek 30th April 2024; Bungowannah 1st May 2024; Corowa 2nd May 2024

Do you know how much water you have stored on farm? Do you know how much you should have in times of drought, and how to get it where you need it? Corowa District Landcare, together with West Hume Landcare, are hosting a series of Farm Water Management Planning workshops.

Peter Smith from Sapphire Irrigation will lead full-day workshops in Corowa, Splitters Creek and Bungowannah. The workshops will assist you with developing a comprehensive Farm Water Management Plan for your enterprise. The plan will cover available water storage, water supply assessment and estimating livestock and farm activity demand.

When you register you will be sent a link to a free introductory unit through Tocal College (estimated to be 1-2hrs). Assistance will be available for estimating your current dam volumes before the workshop to help inform your plan.

What's been happening?

Seed Propagation Success

Participants discovered that cultivating native plants can be simple, affordable and gratifying at our Seed Propagation Workshop in early March. Held at the Corowa Community Garden, Lenore De Garis (Murray Local Land Services) and Kerrie Ormond (Corowa District Landcare) shared practical information about how cultivation works.

Participants at the workshop heard a range of topics including safety, seed pretreatment, growing medium, creating environmental conditions that help germination and tips for success. After morning tea participants got their hands dirty and practiced their propagation skills. All participants received a mini green-house. From seed a range of natives were propagated including: Drooping Sheoak, Spiny Saltbush and Brush Wire Grass. Via vegetative propagation participants took home Weeping Grass and Kangaroo Grass.

Corowa District Landcare are excited to be working on a project to develop a community nursery. The community nursery is where members of the community grow their own native plants, either to plant in their own garden or give away to farmers.

This workshop is supported by Foundation of Rural and Regional Renewal, through funding from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.







Strategic Planning Underway

To help plan and pave the way for the next four years, Corowa District Landcare held a strategic planning day in February. The session was led by experienced Landcarer-turned not-for-profit facilitator, Kim Boswell from The Forever Agenda, and attended by Corowa District Landcare committee members and volunteers.





Changemaker Workshop

Corowa District Landcare's Brendan Christy, Kerrie Ormond and Meredith Mitchell attended a Changemaker workshop in Finley last month. The workshop was facilitated by Paul Ryan from the Australian Resilience Centre.

Community members came together to share their knowledge and further develop their existing leadership skills. Conversations showed a deep understanding of and passion for the broader region and strengthened their connections. The group chatted about industry, community, local economy, impacts of climate, in particular drought, a historical timeline of events and so much more.

The session was part of a national offering funded by the Australian Government Future Drought Fund's Helping Regional Communities Prepare for Drought Initiative currently being delivered by FRRR in partnership with Australian Rural Leadership Foundation.

Protecting the Plains-wanderer

The NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust has been working with landholders in our region to protect grassland habitat suitable for endangered bird, the Plains-wanderer (*Pedionomus torquatus*). Conservation is being bolstered by a minimum of 15 year-long management agreements with the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust. In total, 15,000 hectares of land, including 4,000 hectares of primary Plains-wanderer habitat, has been protected.

Funding Opportunities

On Farm Connectivity Rebate Program

Closes 31st May 2024 or when funding is exhausted, whichever occurs first.

The Australian Government has announced a total of \$30 million for the On Farm Connectivity Rebate Program. For Round 1 of the grant (rebate) opportunity, \$15 million is available in 2023-24. The On Farm Connectivity Program will run over 2 years from 2023-24 to 2024-25 and forms part of the Better Connectivity for Rural and Regional Australia Plan (Better Connectivity Plan) and assists primary producers to take advantage of digital agribusiness solutions to boost productivity and improve safety.

Eligible Primary Producers can only access the program (and rebate) through an eligible Equipment Supplier.

This month we're taking a closer look at the **Plains-wanderer** (*Pedionomus torquatus*). The Plains-wanderer is a small, ground-dwelling bird (12-15 cm) with a wingspan of 28-36 cm. Whilst similar in appearance and mannerism to quails, they are in fact more closely related to shorebirds, yet taxonomically have no close relatives.

The Plains-wanderer's breeding season is generally between May to February. Nests are made by the female who scratches out a hollow in the ground which is lined with straw and grass. The typical clutch size is four eggs.

EPBC status: Critically endangered

Population: An estimated remaining population of 250 – 999

Habitat: Plains-wanderers have specific habitat requirements, requiring semi-arid grasslands with areas of both open and closed cover.

Distribution: Whilst once widespread throughout south-east Australia, the species is now confined to limited areas in Queensland, South Australia and New South Wales. According to the Biodiversity Conservation Trust website "more than 99 per cent of records of plains-wanderers in NSW over the past 30 years come from an area of the western Riverina bounded by Hay and Narrandera on the Murrumbidgee River in the north, the Cobb Highway in the west, the Billabong Creek in the south, and Urana in the east".



Plains-wanderers and suitable habitat may occur in an extended area throughout south-east Australia (light pink), however are more likely to occur in contracted areas (dark pink), with much of the remaining population found in the Riverina.

Threats and conservation actions: Plains-wanderers have experienced pressure from feral pest species such as foxes and cats, and habitat loss through grassland degradation and grazing regimes. Reproduction rates have been limited by the isolation of populations and a changing climate, with longer periods of rainfall and drought affecting the grassland environment. Management actions for the conservation of this species includes fox and cat control, captive breeding and release programs, and landholder and land manager habitat management.
